

This half term in Year 3 we are looking at Geological disasters. For our hook day children became volcanologists and learnt about different geological disasters. The children wrote their name in Latin as we recount the steps of Mount Vesuvius erupting in Pompeii. The children have been reading the book Earth Shattering Events and they have been able to create mini fact files about each disaster.

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As part of their hook lesson, students learned in a unfamiliar environment and discovered that some of us had trouble making friends with other students. After that, we all discussed how it affected our feelings and emotions. In history lesson children are exploring the ancient Islamic civilization this term, as well as how the early Islamic history and current effects connect society today. Additionally, they researched the Golden Age of Islam and its effects on technology, architecture, trade, and travel.






In Year 6 this half term, our theme is 'Make a Difference'.
