#### **WBP Presentation Panel**

Our Presentation Panel meet most Friday afternoons with Mrs Oldfield to look at books across the school to check standards of handwriting and presentation.

Children are invited to join the panel when they have been awarded their **pen licence**. Children's books have to meet a list of very strict criteria in order for a pen licence to be granted including ensuring every book contains joined, cursive handwriting, mistakes are crossed out with one line with a ruler and there is only one digit per square in maths books.







Children work very hard to achieve their pen licence each year and also enjoy being given the responsibility to help raise standards across the school.

## A reminder that we have our Chance To Chat.




