This week we celebrated World Mental Health Day and wore yellow to raise awareness of the importance of looking after our mental health and learned strategies of how we could support each other during difficult times. Mrs Day and Ms Brewer talked to the children in assembly about the importance of talking about their feelings and emotions in order to make sense of them and shared again how our well - being team offer 'chance to chat' sessions for any child wanting to speak to an adult if they fill in one of the slips kept in classrooms. This has been a huge success so far with our well- being coaches spending part of their break and lunchtimes having conversations with children talking through any worries they may have.

We have also been looking ahead to next half term and teachers have been very busy planning exciting learning journeys focused on the children's core texts and autumn 2 topics. Since returning to school in September, the children have been working on their cursive handwriting. They have been focusing on the pride we show in our presentation as well as the content of their writing.


Early Years have been looking at different pictures and matching the initial sound to the picture. They have then challenged themselves to spell out a word which then begins with that sound.




Year 4's core text, Cloud Tea Monkey by Mal Peet and Elspeth Graham has been inspiring the children to raise moral questions and think about fair trade.

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Year 2's core text has been A Walk in London by Salvatore Rubinno. They have been building their writing skills by using coordinating and subordinating conjunctions, capital letters, full stops, and expanded noun phrases.



Year 5 have been writing journey tales inspired by their topic, Rainforests. They have been looking at what language features they need to include to create an effective setting description and challenging themselves to use ambitious adjectives.



Year 3 have been inspired by a Spanish theme and using the core text, Toro Toro by Michael Morpurgo. The children are writing different endings to the story where the main character learns a lesson.




