This week in Reception, we have been exploring various parts of the world and their corresponding habitats. The children have been learning about the types of animals that inhabit different environments, discussing their diets and physical characteristics.

The children have been exploring maps to identify the countries where various animals are found and discussing their respective environments. Additionally, they have engaged in role-playing activities, acting out the movements and behaviors of these animals.









In Year 1 the children have been naming different types of weather and recognising that weather changes across the year and creates seasons. The children have also identified how weather can affect people, animals, and places around the world and how people adapt to it.









In Year 2, students have explored how different climates around the world shape the way people live. From the icy Arctic, where thick clothing and sturdy shelters keep people warm, to the hot deserts, where loose clothing and shady homes help people stay cool, children learn how humans adapt to their environments.







In Year 3, we have been looking at the Roman empire and more specifically, their time in Britain. Last week, the children wrote speeches as Queen Boudicca trying to persuade her fellow tribes to join her and fight against the Romans and their occupation of Britain. Children then used green screen to place themselves in front of their army!









This term, Almond Class have been exploring How the Ancient Greeks Influenced the Modern World! We've learned how democracy began in Athens, where only male citizens over 18 could vote. The children examined the assembly (ecclesia) and council, comparing Ancient Greek democracy to today's system. They even debated how Greek ideas shaped modern government.





This term, Year 5 children are learning about the wonders of the rainforest! They are exploring its different layers, discovering the amazing animals that live there, and finding out how these animals adapt to survive. They are also investigating why rainforests are so important, the threats they face, and why it's essential to protect them.









Year 6 are continuing to explore the topic of World War II and have been asking questions such as how did the large-scale movement of people after World War II shape the world? Children have studied maps showing Jewish migration from Germany and have been thinking about the challenges the migrants faced in their new countries.
